#### SEMESTER CONVERSION REPORT

The School of Law is proud of its heritage and its accomplishments. At the same time, the faculty and administration continue to search for ways to improve our teaching, research and public service.

The noted historian Arnold Toynbee observed that when civilizations failed to meet the challenges of their times, they stagnate, decline, and die. This profound observation applies with equal force to educational institutions in general and law schools in particular. Like civilizations, educational units invariably face crises, each of which is a challenge to the institution's continued stability and growth. If an institution or a school fails to meet these challenges with resourcefulness and creativity, the institution or school, like the civilization of which it is a part, will stagnate, decline, and face possible extinction.

Historically, universities and colleges have not had enviable records in adapting to the needs and challenges of society. Once established, they tend to become traditional and inflexible, clinging to their individual identities rather than adjusting to changing needs.

In 1978, the ABA-AALS Reaccreditation Report contained the following:

The law school operates on the quarter system. Some students and faculty members voiced dissatisfaction with the quarter system, although others believed it

to be advantageous, primarily because of the reduced teaching load available in one quarter and the flexibility provided in attracting outstanding visiting faculty. The principal disadvantages of the quarter system are its limitations on effective utilization of faculty and the curricular and scheduling problems it presents. It seems to be the cause of meager course offerings in some quarters. If the law school considers the advantages of the quarter system to be outweighed by the disadvantages, it should consider petitioning the University for permission to change to the semester system. The team received an indication from the University administration that it would welcome such a petition from the law school. The faculty should reconsider the quarter system at an early date in any event.

In the intervening years, the faculty of the Law School discussed and on two separate occasions approved the conversion of the Law School from a quarter system to a semester system. The last official vote favoring conversion was given at the School of Law Faculty Retreat held on September 17, 1981 at the UGA Botanical Gardens. At the behest of Dean Beaird a special Semester Conversion Committee was created. The committee was composed of Professors Kurtz, Pearson, Wells, and Phillips, Chairman. The Committee has met on several occasions and reviewed materials from other schools that have recently converted from the quarter system to the semester system. Particular attention was given to the conversions at Emory, Mercer, Minnesota, and Tennessee. In the four schools previously mentioned, conversion to the semester system was made by the law schools while other programs at the respective universities continued under the quarter system.

#### SEMESTER SYSTEM ACCEPTANCE AND SUPPORT

As of August, 1982, 161 schools of the 174 ABA accredited schools operate on a semester plan.

The semester system seems to be widely viewed as a system which encourages quality work in various areas by professors who utilize the system. Generally, it is impossible for professors to teach as many subjects when operating on a semester system as they do when teaching on a quarter system. The response would tend to reflect the view that has been taken for many years. The notion seems to be the reduction in the number of courses taught will not only enable each faculty member to become more proficient in his or her selected areas, but it will permit the professor to maintain that proficiency by keeping abreast of recent developments. Arguably, productivity in the limited areas would be enhanced.

#### REASONS FOR CONVERSION

We submit 11 valid reasons for conversion. These areas and reasons are listed below.

#### 1. Administrative

Virtually all administrators are convinced that the semester system is more workable from an administrative standpoint than is the quarter system. Scheduling of courses and final examinations is easier as well as the reduction in the amount of time and effort devoted to registration and related activities.

#### Contact Hours

Four courses will be the average academic year load under the semester system. Currently, our average quarter system load for the academic year is five courses. Under the semester system each professor will teach two courses per semester for a total of four courses per academic year. Our proposal views 10-12 semester hours as an average teaching load. Under the quarter system, we teach two courses for two quarters and one course for one quarter. Conversion to the semester system will afford more efficient employment of our faculty.

#### 3. Admissions

The admissions process is far superior under the semester system. In making admissions decisions, particularly those decisions concerning applicants that would make up the bottom quarter of our class, it is necessary to create a "hold" list. Students on the "hold" list are good, but not outstanding and have applied to other schools in the southeast. Since they are good students, Mercer and Emory, for example, will accept them without delay. With acceptance at other schools, it is necessary for the applicants to make deposits. With other schools being on the semester system, their classes get under way in August. We, seeing some of our better applicants deciding not to enroll with us, move into the "hold" list and find that some of these applicants have

already enrolled at other schools. This procedure subjects us to criticism. We are, at that stage, encouraging students at other schools to withdraw and enroll with us. If we were on a semester system, this potentially embarrassing problem would be obviated.

#### 4. Instruction

Most of the literature supports the position, which is probably shared instinctively by most law professors, that the semester system is much better adapted than the quarter system to a thorough, intensive analysis of the subject matter of law school courses. It is consistently believed that the semester system permits more continuity for both teacher and student. Some sentiment has been expressed to the effect that it would be impossible to treat a course in as satisfactory a manner under the quarter system as the course could be treated under the semester system.

#### 5. Teaching Materials

Nationally recognized casebooks seem to be uniformly viewed as being better suited to the semester system than to the quarter system. Anyone who has attempted to edit a casebook in order to make it suitable for a quarter-system course seems to agree with this position.

#### 6. Seminars & Research

With respect to seminars and supervised research,

which we have been encouraging for the past several years, and which led to the promulgation of our senior writing requirement, the semester system gives the needed time to students and to faculty members for research, writing and evaluating papers submitted. It is unrealistic to expect students to select topics, carefully research the topics and draft papers in 10 weeks. The additional time under a semester system will enrich both quality and quantity of research produced.

#### 7. Class Schedules

In scheduling classes, the semester approach is a much more efficient and workable system. First, two schedules must be prepared rather than three.

Second, class times may be chosen in such a way to avoid overloading. Third, students will have more time to do outside reading and incorporate all that has been learned in class and out of class for review materials. Another way of looking at the more efficient scheduling of classes is to consider that a faculty of 31 teaching five courses, plus the administrators teaching nine courses, generates 164 courses under the quarter system. By the same token, under the semester system there would be 130 courses. More depth of coverage is possible with substantial variety remaining.

#### Reading Days

The semester system allows reading days to be

built into the system without encroaching upon the full 14 weeks allowed for class instruction and a reasonable examination period. Most schools do build in reading days and this is possible without any real difficulty under the semester system. On the other hand, under the quarter system, reading days either cut into class time which violates current Regent policies or encroaches upon vacation time. Either option is really not acceptable and leads us to be without reading days. At best, one reading day is provided for in the schedule.

#### 9. Examinations

The fact that examinations will be given only twice a year under the semester system is viewed as an advantage by the faculty and students. There is some feeling that students will give more attention to the day-to-day learning experience afforded under the semester system when they are not subject to the constantly recurring pressure of quarter system final examinations.

#### 10. Special Bar Examination Requirements

The semester system might reduce, at least to some extent, the negative educational impact of the February Bar examination. At the very least, students would no longer be confronted with the problem of taking winter quarter final examinations immediately after the February Bar examination.

The semester system allocates course hours in a manner that complies with some rather specific Bar admission requirements that recently have been promulgated in Indiana, New York and South Carolina.

#### 11. Placement

The ABA mandates that we have a placement office. We comply with the mandate but are handicapped by being on the guarter system. Our students seeking jobs while attending school under the quarter system face several Students and graduates of schools operating problems. under the semester system are out and in the market place approximately a month before our students are free to move into the work arena. Our students could work a month beyond what other students do but that does not offset their late start. Our students are at a considerable disadvantage in showing up for clerkships approximately a month after the vast majority of clerks have arrived on the scene. Our students sense, correctly or incorrectly, that they are behind and have to overcome tremendous odds in drawing even with those that are competing for limited jobs with major firms. If we were on the semester plan, our students could join the work force on an equal footing. Given the quality of our students, they could take with them confidence and experience to perform as well, if not better than, other students.

Timing for job placement is critical. We should assist our students rather than hindering their efforts to locate positions in an ever-more competitive market. Conversion to the semester system will allow us to improve our performance in this vitally important area.

#### CONCLUSIONS

The adoption of a semester plan would:

- 1. Add the University of Georgia to the same academic calendar now employed by 161 law schools out of 174 accredited by the American Bar Association.
- 2. Provide significant academic and administrative benefits to faculty, students, and administration.
- 3. Increase the flexibility in course offerings and more fully utilize faculty time.
- 4. Provide financial and operational efficiencies both in academic and administrative matters.
- 5. Provide an opportunity for the School of Law to re-assess and restructure course and program offerings.

#### Calendaring

The Committee proposes a calendaring norm that has fall semester and spring semester beginning on a Monday. Each semester shall have 14 weeks of instruction, excluding weekends and holidays, and closes on a Friday. examination period of no more than 10 days should follow with examinations scheduled Monday through Friday only with weekends (including that proceeding the first examination and during the examination period) reserved as "reading periods." The Committee further proposes that the Summer Term have seven (7) weeks of instruction (excluding weekends and holidays) plus an examination period of no more than seven (7) days (excluding weekends). The Summer Term should be operated as a half semester, with classes meeting the equivalent of twice as often per week per semester as during the regular academic year. The following holidays would be observed during the term in which they fall:

- (1) Independence Day (July 4)
- (2) Thanksgiving Day
- (3) Friday after Thanksgiving Day
- (4) A 5-day Spring Recess

#### Conversion of Credits

The Committee proposes that the semester system become effective with the beginning of Fall Term 1983; that all quarter hours earned for courses completed at the conversion date be converted to the equivalent number of semester hours and the semester hours required for the J.D. degree be as shown in Table 1; that quarters of residence earned at the conversion date be converted to the equivalent number of semesters of residence as shown in Table 2.
