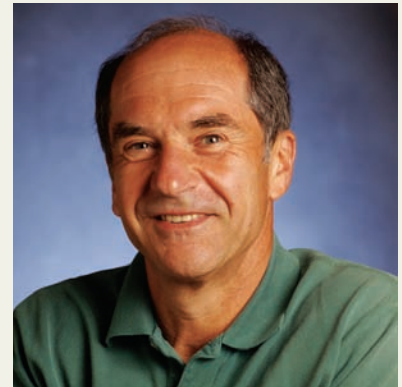

## Hellerstein receives NTA’s highest honor

The National Tax Association presented its most prestigious award, the Daniel M. Holland Medal for distinguished lifetime contributions to the study and practice of public finance, to Shackelford Distinguished Professor of Taxation Law Walter Hellerstein.

Hellerstein joined the Georgia Law faculty in 1978 and was named the Francis Shackelford Distinguished Professor in 1999. He teaches in the areas of state and local taxation, international taxation and federal income taxation.

Scholarly works by Hellerstein include the leading treatise in the state tax field, the leading casebook on state and local taxation and more than 100 articles in professional journals addressing state and local tax issues.

Recently, *State Tax Notes* named Hellerstein the nation’s most influential academic in state and local taxation, and he also received BNA Tax Management’s Franklin C. Latham Award for Distinguished Service in State and Local Tax Law.

Having practiced extensively in the state tax field, Hellerstein has been involved in numerous state tax cases before the U.S. Supreme Court.

The NTA began presenting the Holland Medal during 1993 in honor of Dan Holland, a professor of economics at the Massachusetts Institute of Technology.

**Kurtz receives national child support award**



Associate Dean and Hosch Professor Paul Kurtz received the National Child Support Enforcement Association's Child Support Community Service Award in February.

**S**chool of Law Associate Dean and Hosch Professor Paul M. Kurtz was recently honored with the National Child Support Enforcement Association's Child Support Community Service Award.

This award recognizes an individual who, though not directly part of the child support world, has made significant contributions to the child support community by devoting interest, time, talent and training to the improvement of child support enforcement.

Kurtz served as a reporter and member of the drafting committee of the Uniform Interstate Family Support Act for the National Conference of Commissioners on Uniform State Laws, which revolutionized interstate enforcement of child support and has been enacted in each of the 50 states. He was also a reporter for the NCCUSL drafting committee on the Status of Children of Assisted Conception.

Specializing in criminal law and family law, Kurtz joined the Georgia Law faculty in 1975. He became associate dean for academic and student affairs in 1991 and was named a J. Alton Hosch Professor of Law during 1994.

Very active in legislative issues, Kurtz was a reporter for the Georgia Supreme Court's Indigent Defense Reform Commission from 2000 to 2003 and was a member of the Public Interest Loan Repayment Task Force appointed by then Gov. Roy E. Barnes (J.D.'72). He currently serves on the 15-member Georgia Public Defender Standards Council, which operates the state's system of indigent criminal defense. He is also a commissioner for NCCUSL, representing Georgia, and serves on several drafting committees.

### Third Public Interest Fellow focuses on heir property



Serving as the school's third Public Interest Fellow is Crystal Chastain Baker (J.D.'03), whose project focuses on helping owners of heir property in Georgia.

This past fall, Crystal Chastain Baker (J.D.'03) (hosted by the Young Professional's Council of the Georgia Appleseed Center for Law and Justice) joined Georgia Law as its third Public Interest Fellow.

Baker's project focuses on helping owners of heir property throughout Georgia. Heir property is land held in common by the descendants of someone who has died without a valid will or without a legal transfer of property.

Heir property is more prevalent in agricultural communities and low-income situations and

results from a lack of clear title in land ownership, according to Baker.

"There are families throughout Georgia who are losing their ancestors' land because they don't have a valid will. They are still operating on verbal bequeaths, which Georgia law does not recognize," Baker said.

With a background in real estate law, Baker has seen first hand the devastation caused by land loss.

"Much history follows land passed down through generations, and families are attached to land because of that history," Baker added.

The goals of the Heir Property Project include finding ways to provide owners of heir property with the tools they need to protect and preserve their property while also generating wealth and economic value among those landowners, increasing the capacity of service providers to offer pro bono services in Georgia so as to enable providers going forward the ability to address and remedy the problems associated with heir property, and finding sustainable solutions by increasing awareness about heir property.

The Public Interest Fellowship Program offers experienced lawyers the chance to provide civil legal services to needy Georgians while engaging law students in the process. Public Interest Fellows are given two years to develop their project while working with a host organization that will potentially continue to support the project once the fellowship term has ended.

Patterson joined the law school in 1986 teaching in the areas of legal profession, copyright and legal malpractice. He was frequently called upon

to provide expert testimony on matters of legal ethics and copyright infringement, and advised state and national policymakers on the subjects. He passed away approximately five years ago after a brief bout with lung cancer.

He also served as chair of the Admissions Committee for approximately five years.

An expert in corporate governance and the co-author of the leading case book *Corporations and Other Business Associations: Cases and Materials*, O’Kelley joined the law school faculty in 1997.

Previously, he practiced in Atlanta for five years and taught at Tulane University, the University of Alabama, the University of Virginia and the University of Oregon.

At Oregon, O’Kelley founded and served as the first director of the Law and Entrepreneurship Center. He was also its associate dean from 1993 to 1994 and interim dean from 1994 to 1997.

O’Kelley earned his bachelor’s degree from the University of the South, his Juris Doctor from the University of Texas at Austin and his Master of Laws from Harvard University.
