MEMORANDUM

As we begin the next phase of Fall Semester registration, I write to provide some updates about the Fall Schedule. In addition to the information provided here, additional information about courses and faculty are provided in my memorandum of April 15, 2003 on Registration for Fall, 2003.

Remedies—This 3-credit course will be taught by [Professor Shipley](#) from 9:30-10:20 on Monday, Wednesday and Friday. The course description appears in the on-line Student Handbook.

Land Use Clinic—The classroom component for this clinic, taught by [Ms. Jamie Baker-Roskie](#), will meet at 12:30-1:20 on Monday and Wednesday.

Pre-Trial Litigation—This course will be taught at 2:30-4:20 on Tuesday by [Mr. Gary Gerrard](#). In this 2-credit course, the student will play the role of a lawyer in a civil law firm assigned cases for which he or she is primarily responsible. Beginning with the decision to whether accept representation of a particular client, the course will cover each of the major steps necessary to get a civil case ready to start trial. There are no pre-requisites for this course, but Evidence and Legal Profession are suggested as helpful courses to have completed. The course enrollment will be limited to 12 students.

Trial Practice—A section of this course will be taught by [Mr. Steve Harper](#) on Tuesday at 3:30 to 6:20 in the Rusk Courtroom.

Trial Practice—A section of this course will be taught by [Mr. Ken Mauldin](#) on Thursday at 3:30 to 6:20 in the Hirsch Hall Courtroom.

Arbitration Seminar—This will be taught by [Dean and Professor Emeritus J. Ralph Beard](#) on Wednesdays from 3:30 to 5:20.

Minicourses for the Fall Semester

Five one-credit minicourses will be offered during the fall semester. Students may register for them until the first day of the course.

Regional Integration in Africa—The end of the the 20th century witnessed a rethinking of regional organization in Africa, led by a number of leaders who have promised an “African Renaissance” which includes a number of proposals. This package of plans, known as New Economic Partnership for African Development, has been adopted by the continent as one of the pillars of the African Union, the new continental organization which replaced the Organization for African Unity. The course will give an overview of African regionalization since independence. Beside the continental organizations, the course will examine the Economic Community of Western African States (ECOWAS), the Common Market for Eastern and Southern Africa (COMESA) and the Southern African Development Community (SADC). It will focus on how the organizations deal with conflict prevention and resolution, how disputes are settled and economic integration. The course will be taught by Professor Stefaan Smis of the Centre for International Law at the Free University of Brussels. He has been published widely, including in the Georgia Journal of International and Comparative Law and the American Journal of International Law.

International Law and Security Regimes—This course will cover the UN Charter and use of force under it (including issues of preemption and self-defense), but will also cover the UN affiliated agencies (IAEA, UNMOVIC) and other regimes and conventions comprising the field of nonproliferation and arms control/disarmament. These include the Nuclear Nonproliferation Treaty, the Chemical Weapons Convention, the Biological Weapons Convention, and the associated multilateral export control regimes (the Nuclear Suppliers Group, the Missile Technology Control Regime, the Australia Group and the Wassenaar Arrangement). In the context of security regimes, the course will also deal with distinctions between hard and soft international law and the mechanisms of compliance with international law in this most sovereignty-sensitive area. The course will be taught by Daniel Joyner, a Fellow at the Center for International Trade and Security at the University. He is a graduate of the Duke Law School, where he was an editor of the Duke Journal of Comparative and International Law. He also was an associate at Alston and Bird in Atlanta.

Legal Systems in the Middle East—This course will give a comparative overview of selected legal systems in the Middle East, focusing primarily on the Israeli, Palestinian, Egyptian, and Saudi Arabian systems, although different legal systems may be included or substituted based on current events. The course will examine the historical and religious foundations of the selected legal systems, as well as their development over the last century, the current state of the law, and possible future developments.

The course will be taught by Ms. Lee Ann Bambach who studied Judaism and Islam at the Hebrew University of Jerusalem and at Harvard University, where she earned her M.T.S. She speaks Hebrew and Arabic, and is the author of "Women at the Wall: Finding a Place for Women in Judaism," published in Church Divinity. She earned her J.D. at the Law School and was editor in chief of the Georgia Law Review. After graduation, she clerked for the Hon. Sam J. Ervin, III on the United States Fourth Circuit Court of Appeals and was an associate at the D.C. office of Latham and Watkins. She currently is on the Board of the Iraqi Free Officers and Civilians Movement.

This course will meet from October 1 through October 24 at 1:30-3:20 on Wednesdays and Fridays in Room H.

Problems of International Trade Law--- This course will provide an introduction into institutional and substantive WTO (GATT) law and analysis of WTO (GATT) case law. The legal structure of the organization will be discussed as well as the legal techniques used in trade regulation and trade liberalization. The focus will be on the General Agreement

on Tariffs and Trade (GATT) that has served as the basis for the General Agreement on Trade Services (GATS). An overview will be given of the different philosophy and structure of the Agreement on Trade Related Aspects of Intellectual Property Rights (TRIPS). The course will only incidentally deal with the substantive law of GATS and TRIPS and will not cover Subsidies and Countervailing, SPS, TBT or other special agreements.

The course will be taught by Kim Van der Borght, who is Lecturer in Law at the University of Hull in the United Kingdom. He earned his undergraduate and law degrees at the free University of Brussels and did post-graduate work at the University of the West of England. He is on the Roster of Panelists of the World Trade Organization in Geneva. He has lectured throughout the world and authored or co-authored a number of books, book chapters and articles.

International Legal Research—This course provides an overview of international law, with an emphasis on the resources and skills used to locate relevant international and foreign resources. Although students and researchers of international and comparative law should find this course particularly useful, non-specialists will also find it helpful in an increasingly global arena.

The course will be taught by [Ms. Anne Burnett](#), Foreign and International Law and Reference Librarian at the Law School, and Dean Wilner. Ms. Burnett is 1990 cum laude graduate of the Law School and served as Editor in Chief of the Georgia Journal of International and Comparative Law. She earned her Master's in Library Science from the University of Texas in 1994 and came to the Law Library after serving on the staff of the Young Law Library of the University of Arkansas School of Law.

The course will meet on Thursday from 5 to 7 p.m. in room H beginning on August 28 and concluding on October 9.
