Student Bar Association

The Student Bar Association has sought during the academic year 1972-1973 to be a moving factor in the growth and development of the Law School.

Through its elected officers and Board of Governors, the SBA continued to coordinate student-faculty liaison activities and student services. Members of the Board served on joint faculty-administrative committees which directed some key Law School programs this year.

Among these were the Curriculum Committee, the Library Committee, and the Dean Search Committee. The Student Bar Association initiated in-depth studies of curriculum problems last spring and it plans to conduct a student referendum this fall to determine recommendations for curriculum development.

SBA members on the Library Committee represented views of the student body in proposing uses to which the law portion of the new university library will be devoted.

At the end of winter quarter, all students were given opportunity to complete evaluation forms on their instructor's teaching performance. The purpose of his survey was to determine those areas of classroom instruction which need strengthening and to offer suggestions for improvement from the student body.

The Student Bar Association continued to sponsor major social events which have become law school traditions. The Barristers Ball in February, the Libel Party in April, and the Law Day cocktail party were arranged by SBA committees.

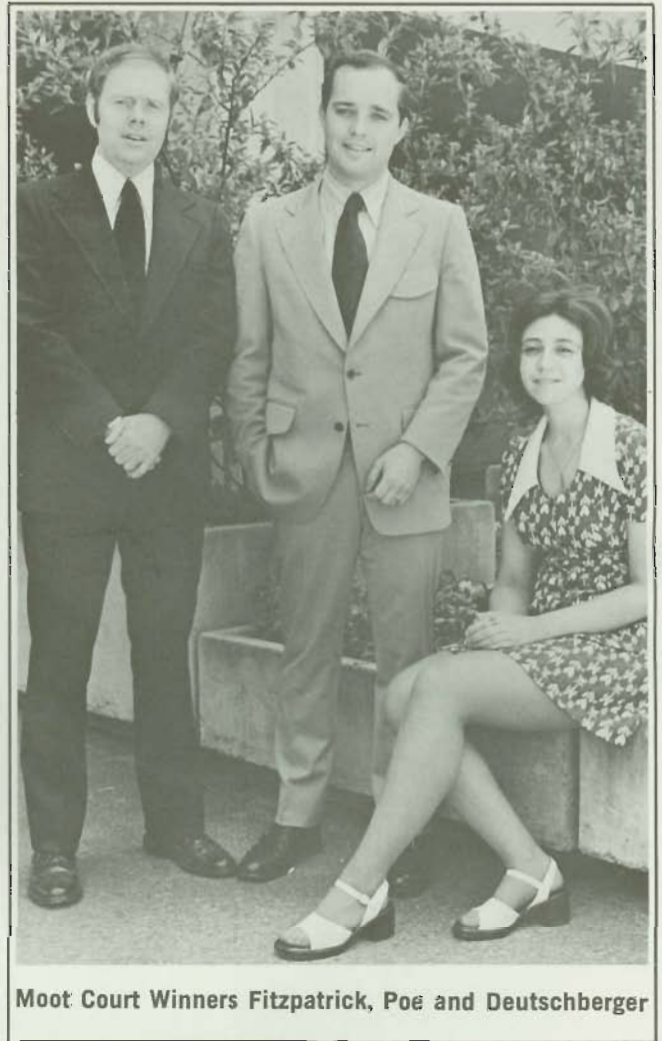

Moot Court Board

The Moot Court Board again this year planned and managed an extensive Moot Court program. In the fall, an excellent team represented the Law School in the regional rounds of the National Moot Court Competition in Atlanta. While the team did not make the final round, their brief was selected as second place.

In March the Southern Intercollegiate Moot Court Competition was held in New Orleans, Louisiana. Teams representing Duke, North Carolina, Tulane and Georgia participated. For each of the three years of the competition, Georgia has won the tournament. This year Georgia had a plenary victory; Best Team, Best Brief and Best Oralist.

Emory University won the 1973

Georgia Interscholastic Competition but the Lumpkin Law School again presented the best brief. This title has been won by Georgia for three years.

The Moot Court competitions for the year concluded with two intramural competitions which were heard by the Law Day panel of judges. The fourth annual Richard B. Russell Competition, an event open to first year students, was, for the second year, won by a female law freshman - Lois Deutschberger.

Second-year students John Fitzpatrick and Jim Poe were named best team of the Law Day Competition for upperclassmen.

Georgia Law Review

First issued in 1966, the **Georgia Law Review** is now an established legal periodical published four times a year with a national circulation of 2000.

In 1972-73 the **Review** published issue 4 of Volume 6 and four issues of Volume 7.

The publication's focus in upcoming issues is the area of special projects. Editorial Board members recently completed an empirical survey of disciplinary procedures in relation to due process rights of Georgia prisoners. Results will be published in one of the first issues of Volume 8.

Georgia Journal of International and Comparative Law

The Georgia Law School has gained an increasingly widespread reputation as a center for studies in international law. The **Georgia Journal**, established in 1969, continues to provide a review of recent literature and developments in this field as well as a presentation of in-depth studies by prominent international scholars.

The **Georgia Journal's** staff this year was made up of ten third-year members of the Managing Board and 17 second-year members of the Editorial Board.

This staff published three issues of Volumes 2 and 3 in 1972-73.

Increased subscriptions and inclusion in the Law School budget provided a more stable financial position for the **Georgia Journal** this year. Student interest in writing for the publication is high. Fifty-five first year students expressed their interest in trying out for the 1973-74 Editorial Board.

When Miss Yawn joined the law school administrative faculty in November, she took responsibility for law school information services and thus assumed the production of the **Advocate**.
