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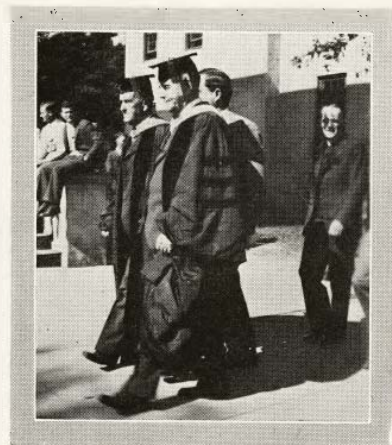

breaking task of preparing an equally as important Document No. 2.

Dealing with personnel, it was intensely personal, a sheet which both made careers and smashed them. Where Document No. 1 had made Deans out of Presidents, Document No. 2 made Professors of Deans, Associates of Professors, Instructors of Associates, & many times where age or inefficiency demanded, it commanded complete withdrawal.

It was an economy & efficiency scheme working with a vengeance, the result of long deliberation by Sanford. It mercilessly removed deadwood, insured for those that stayed a salary level compatible with their position.

May 12, it, like Document No. 1, was shuffled into the shiny new brief case, & Sanford, bearing the destiny of two hundred-odd men, visibly showing the strain his task had imposed, departed again for Atlanta.

Regents conferred, adopted with few changes or suggestions the manuscript recommendations. No display resulted. Quietly distressed, those who felt the administrative axe prepared to go away in July as contracts withdrawn from every employee in March were not reissued to them.

Quietly jubilant, those retained prepared for summer school work, breathed easier as the shadow hovering over them for a year was removed.

¶ Chancellor Charles Mercer Snelling, realizing the years of steady & intense

work required to complete reorganization, conscious of his own advanced age, resigned to become Chancellor Emeritus. Regents redistributed the duties, saved money, appointed no successor.

Chancellor Snelling's life has been one of busy, hard-working devotion to education. Born in Richmond, Virginia, November 3, 1862, he graduated from Virginia Military Academy in 1884. He came to the University in 1888 from South Georgia College as an adjunct professor of mathematics and commandant of Cadets. After study in Germany during 1893 and 1894 he became by steady advancement President of Franklin College and Dean of the University in 1909.

Chancellor Barrow's withdrawal from Active duties in 1925 made Snelling acting Chancellor, and then in 1926 Chancellor of the University of Georgia.

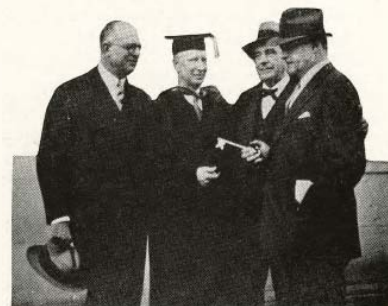
1932 saw him move up to the newly created Chancellorship of the entire University System of Georgia, highest Educational honor in the state, from which he resigned in 1933 to become Chancellor Emeritus.

Feature of Homecoming was the dedication of Harold Hirsch Hall, new home of the Lumpkin Law School & Alexander Campbell King Memorial Library.

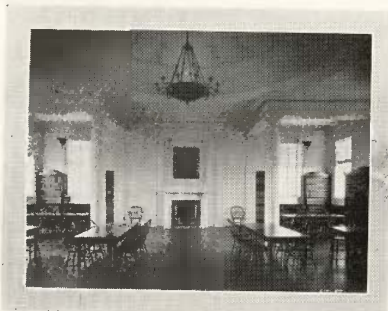
